The presence of children in outdoor public spaces

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Background:

The idea of 'children's outdoor environments' is often restricted to playgrounds, sportsfields and parks



■ The presence of children in shopping streets and alfresco areas is little described



Aim

To find the prevalence and numbers of children in outdoor places

Methods

From our 2011 observation data on the prevalence of smoking in public outdoor places, we extracted:

- the number and prevalence of children
- in a range of places in England,Scotland and New Zealand






Results

- 5553 people were observed at 91 outdoor locations
- Of these, 733 appeared to be children aged 12 or under (13% of the total)



- However, streets have more people than playgrounds (up to 44,000/hr v under 1000/hr)
- The *number* of children in a setting can be up to 3000/hr in streets v under 300/hr in playgrounds



Conclusions

- We need to consider children in places *not* normally thought of as 'children's places'
- We may need to adapt behaviours and physical spaces: eg, smokefree outdoor policies
